Academic Excellence

Little Otters: We are explorers and active learners... Little otters dug up time capsules in the garden. We washed it off and read the words "to be dug up in 2062". The Little Otters were very intrigued and spoke about it being a treasure and how we must follow the instructions.

Kingfishers: This week we have been finishing off our wonderful learning about Uganda. Last week we completed our research projects and information reports bringing together all of our learning. We also created our inspiring speaker TED Talks which you will find on Seesaw. We will be moving on to learning about Easter and find out 'Why does Easter matter to Christians?'

Swallows: Swallows have started a new unit on a non-chronological report on the Civil Rights Movement. We have learnt about colons, semi-colons and relative clauses this week based on some of the inspiring changemakers of the past. The children are really interested in how black and white people were treated differently. We have finished our maths unit on mass and volume and we will be moving on to shape and geometry.

Character Education

Little Otters: We are relationship builders... We have had a new starter within preschool. The children have shown great friendship and have supported the new child showing them our daily structure and making sure they felt happy.

Kingfishers: In Kingfishers this week we have started thinking about our new virtue 'Aspiration and Leadership'. We have explored three inspiring changemakers this week who are going to be the names of our new House Teams Greta Thunberg, David Attenborough and Rosa Parks. We have thought about what the word 'Aspiration' means and what our aspirations are for ourselves.

Swallows: The children have been resilient in their learning this week. They have worked hard on their grammar in English whilst reflecting on the inspiration of Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King.



The new virtue for this week is aspiration and leadership and the children have been thinking about how they can be aspirational leaders and who they aspire to be like.

Community

Little Otters: We care for our world... We have frog spawn in pre-school that we are studying, we now have tadpoles; the children have been finding out what they eat and how we can clean the water. We found they eat fish food and lettuce leaves and to clean the tank we need to pull grass with a root out of the ground and leave it in the tank.

Kingfishers: This week we have been out in the town of Great Torrington, strutting our stuff on the dance floor. Streetz, a community dance company, ran a dance festival for primary schools, led by Amy and a team of Year 7 GTS students. They were inspiring leaders and the children from Clinton and Dolton KS1 had an amazing time. We are currently planning a trip out to Exmoor zoo, which will be fantastic. So important to take our learning out of school and support local businesses at the same time.

Swallows: Beaford Art Centre joined us again for a day of rich storytelling. The children heard stories told by heart, sang songs, created new characters for a story and thought about colours when hearing sounds. They showed great respect while listening and responded well.

We have also been thinking about the North American communities in our geography. Last week we continued to edit our videos on comparisons and this week we have researched one country to present our TED talks on.

Digital and Innovation

Little Otters: We are creative and critical thinkers... Little otters have been exploring a variety of natural materials creating different pictures. They have also been looking at jungle animals and created pathways for the animals to move round the room using wooden blocks.

Kingfishers: Last week Kingfishers recorded their TED talks on the schools' iPads and we posted them on Seesaw, which continues to be a great source of sharing their learning with you. We hope you enjoyed seeing them as Inspiring Speakers. This week the children have been using the laptops to learn how to switch on, login and navigate the infinite world of the web to support their learning in maths. They have also been using the creative areas to role play life in Uganda and innovate everyday objects into creative and imaginary learning. Today the children were using their imagination to tell stories about a mystery object.

Swallows: The children have been innovative in their DT these past few weeks creating their moving toy with Mrs Clarke. They have learnt many new skills to complete the task showing perseverance and teamwork. I look forward to seeing the finished products.

They have also used their Chromebooks to research countries in North America which has provided a rich range of information for them to use.
